
During her study in Albury, she participated in additional training which provided her invaluable experience in the areas of cultural competency, LGBTIQ competency, taping and massage.

Smoking Even One Cigarette a Day Raises Cardiovascular Risk

A study has found that that there's been a big shift from people smoking 20 to 25 cigarettes a day down to only smoking a few cigarettes a day, assuming that's good enough for them.

Their view is that smoking only a couple a day can't be harmful and, while that's probably not far off the truth for risk for cancer, the fact is that even one cigarette a day is still harmful to your cardiovascular health.

If you want to quit smoking, call and ask to speak with one of our Smoking Cessation Nurses today. It's a free, one-on-one service.

If you've tried giving up in the past, don't let that hold you back. The thing to remember is to NEVER GIVE UP GIVING UP.

Working for More Rural GPs

The Gannawarra Medi-Workforce met again in Cohuna in February to find solutions to the doctor shortage in the area. Representatives NDCH, Cohuna District Hospital, Kerang Dis-Health, Ochre Health, Echuca Regional Health, Swan Hill District Health. Gannawarra Shire and Murray River Council were in attendance. Expertise was provided by the Rural Doctors Association of Victoria, the Rural Workforce Agency of Victoria, and the Murray City Country Coast (MCCC) GP Training. The Murray Primary Health Network and Department of Health & Human Services were also there.

This is the second time the workforce met with a commitment to working together to attract doctors to the area.



LGBTIQ AFFIRMATIVE PRACTICE TRAINING

Ren Grayson from the Victorian AIDS Council (VAC) presented a session on LGBTIQ Affirmative Practice on 21st February. Participants included a large number of NDCH staff, Board of Directors, and staff from partner agencies. The training was part of the Victorian Government's additional funding to organisations like NDCH who provided counselling and support services to the LGBTIQ community who were negatively impacted during last year's Same Sex Marriage postal survey campaign.

NDCH is committed to diversity and inclusiveness in all we do, both as a health service provider and an employer. But there is always more we can do and we are working at all levels of the organisation towards getting it done.

Even though Marriage Equality passed (YAY!), "there is also trauma from the drawn-out postal survey campaign, which saw attacks on rainbow families and communities. It left many feeling vulnerable and distressed. In some

cases, it brought back painful memories of the bullying and abuse they were subjected to in their adolescence."

This practice is committed to maintaining the confidentiality of your personal health information. Your medical record is a confidential document. It is the policy of this practice to maintain the security of personal health information at all times and to ensure that this information is only available to authorised members of staff.

PRESCRIPTIONS

All patients must be seen for repeat prescriptions.

No phone or over the counter prescriptions will be taken. You may need a blood pressure check, blood sugar, or pathology which is ordered by your doctor. This ensures BETTER HEALTH CARE for you and your family.

FEES

All accounts are required to be paid on the day of visit. The standard consultation fee is \$68.

Fees vary according to time and/or services provided.

Your claim will be sent to Medicare electronically who will pay your rebate direct to your nominated bank account.

We are not a bulk billing clinic.

PENSION CARD HOLDER FEES

Pensioner card holders will be charged an out-ofpocket fee of \$30 payable on the day for three visits each calendar year.

Nurse practitioners work at an advanced level in many clinical practice settings, which include diabetes care, emergency care, intensive care, women's health, aged care, palliative care, paediatrics, urology, wound management, mental health, rural and remote health, men's health, community health, young people's health, sexual health, pain management, opthamology, renal, respiratory, neonatal, orthopaedics, neurosurgery, chronic heart failure, cardiology, continence and oncology.
